
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Message from EOC

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

GED scoring levels

The GED exams are measured on a 100-200 scale. In order to pass, the student must have at least a 145.

The high school equivalency score is 145-164.

The college-ready score is 165-174.

The college ready plus college credit score is 175-200.

 Obtaining a college ready plus credit score on a subtest (math, science, social studies and Language arts) can earn you up to 3 college credits in that topic.

Studying Habits

- Do NOT cram all your studying in one session
- Plan what you're going to study
- Plan specific times for studying, build the habit
- Leave phone in a separate room
- Find a good studying spot, away from distractions
- Avoid social media during study time
 - Apps such as Focus Booster and AntiSocial helps block access of select sites until the timer you set is up

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
