Christmas trees were once decorated with fruit, popcorn, and candles before electric lights were invented. 33 million real Christmas trees are sold in the U.S. each year.

Santa Claus has many different names around the world. In the UK, he is also known as Father Christmas. Other names he's called by include Kris Kringle, Sinterklaas, and Pere Noel! Saint Nicholas was a 4th Century Christian Bishop from Turkey known for his generosity. He later became mythologized into the Santa Claus we know today!



The historic St. Nicholas heard about the plight of a local man who did not have enough dowry money to marry off his three daughters. Christmas

Christmas is a holiday celebrated on December 25th to honor the birth of Jesus Christ, an important figure in Christianity. People celebrate in many ways, like decorating Christmas trees, exchanging gifts, singing carols, and spending time with family and friends. For some, it's a religious holiday with church services, while for others, it's a festive time filled with joy and traditions.

Santa Claus, a cheerful figure who delivers presents, is also a big part of Christmas fun. It's a season of giving, kindness, and celebration.

Hannukah

Hanukkah, also called the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day Jewish holiday that usually happens in December. It celebrates a miracle that happened long ago when a small amount of oil kept the menorah, a special lamp, burning for eight days in a temple. During Hanukkah, families light candles on a menorah each night, one for each day of the holiday. People also celebrate by playing games like dreidel, eating foods cooked in oil like latkes and doughnuts, and spending time with loved ones. It's a time to remember the importance of faith, hope, and staying strong.

Kwanzaa

Kwanzaa is a holiday that celebrates African-American culture, history, and community. It lasts for seven days, from December 26th to January 1st. Each day focuses on a special value, like unity, self-determination, or creativity, called the Nguzo Saba (the Seven Principles). Families light candles on a special holder called a kinara to honor each principle. People celebrate with songs, dancing, storytelling, and a big feast called Karamu. Kwanzaa is a time to reflect on heritage, share traditions, and look forward to a bright future together.
